> Documentarian whose 1967 exposé of Bridgewater State Hospital, "Titicut Follies", was banned from general distribution. He continues to make films.

3. **Prorter Square Theatre (1930-c.1950) - 1994 Mass**

"Love means never having to say you're sorry."

Ave A neighborhood movie house now home to a martial arts school, a recording studio, and other small businesses.

#Harvard Theatre (1914-1955) - 2313 Mass. Ave.

An old neighborhood cinema once operated by M&P Theatres, a Paramount affiliate.

Jefferson Park - The Dark End of the Street (1981)

> An eight-year-old Ben Affleck debuted in this independent film of working-class life in our city's often ignored housing projects.




Opened as a General Cinema in the 1970's. this theater now shows new


releases and a full range of Indian and other foreign-language films.

8. **Harvard Square Theatre (1926-2012) - 10**


Church St Originally built as the University Theatre and decorated in an Italian Renaissance style, the lobby looked straight into the heart of Harvard Square. In the 1960's, it was renamed and became well known as an art house. hosting special screenings and double features. Concerts featured notables such as David Bowie, Iggy Pop, The Clash, and Bob Dylan. The cult film 'Rocky Horror Show' played Saturday nights from 1984 until the theater's close.

The Tasty - Good Will Hunting (1997)

This sandwich shop was a Harvard Square institution, serving the Square for 81 years and closing in 1997.

- 11. J Press 21 (2008)
- 12. Grendel's Den The Town (2010)
- **13. Tanus Cinema** (1975-1988) 57 Boylston St

Part of the Galeria Mall, it was closed by the end of the 1990s and converted to additional mall shops.

14. Brattle Theatre (est 1953) - 40 Brattle St

Located in historic Brattle Hall, the Brattle Theatre is "Boston's unofficial film school," showing the best in classic, cult, independent, and world cinema.

- 16. Harvard-Epworth Church Blown Away (1994)
- 17. Harvard Film Archive (est 1979) 24 Ouincy St

In addition to housing the largest university-based motion picture collection, the Archive shows a variety of classic, foreign, independent, and silent films Friday through Monday year-round.

18. Dunkin' Donuts - Good Will Hunting (1997)

"How do you like them apples?"

19. Orson Wells Cinema (1964-1986) - 1001 Mass Ave

Opened as the Esquire in 1964, the theater specialized in first run art and independent films, and had some occasional revival series. After a fire in the mid-1980's, the space was put to other use.

- ₹21. ∰Durrell Theater (est 1897) 820 Mass Ave

Located in the YMCA Building. It was restored and reopened for live theater in 2002.

- 22. Cheapo Records Between the Lines (1977)
- 423. **Central Suuare Theatre (1919-1962) 573 Mass Ave**

The grand marquee is long gone but the building

still stands. An Indian grocery store and a liquor market currently occupy the space.



15 Pearl St

Now a senior

citizen center, this became Off the Wall's second location (see 28) after a failed move to the Faneuil Hall Marketplace.



§ 25. ■ Rex Theatre (1910-) 1954) - 2 Western Ave

Located in a unique narrow triangular building, the theater was richly decorated and about four stories high. The theater's marquee was at the narrow end of the building, facing Central Square. Prior to 1948, it was known first as The Cambridge and then as The Olympia

26. Florence St Rooming House - Boston Strangler [1968]

27. **Central Square Cinemas (1968-1980) - 415 Mass**

Ave The programming consisted mostly of recent foreign films and revivals. A 5-year run of Philippe de Broca's 1966 "King of Hearts" spawned a cult following that gave the film new life.

28.90ff the Wall (1976 - 1980) - 861 Main St

Known as a "Coffeehouse of the Arts", the atmosphere was relaxed with coffee and baked goods served instead of popcorn. On any given day you might see silent films, short subjects, rock concert films, documentaries, or animation. The more obscure, the better!

29. Xandmark Kendall Square (est 1995) - 1 Kendall Sq

The Landmark Kendall Square Cinema showcases independent film, foreign language cinema, restored classics, and documentaries.

30. **Eechmere Theatre (1941-1957) - 585 Cambridge St**

A short-lived movie theatre near the Lechmere area.

.31.3 Errol Morris (b. 1948)

Fourth Floor Productions, 650 Cambridge St

Best known as a documentary filmmaker. In 2002 he directed a series of television ads for Apple Computer as part of the popular "Switch" campaign.

32.¶nman Square **Theatre (1930-**1955) - 1320 **Cambridge St**

A theater that once stood next door to S&S Restaurant. The space is now occupied by the East Cambridge Savings Bank.



33.4369 Coffeehouse - The Good Mother (1988)

Based on local author Sue Miller's novel of the same name, scenes were filmed at this cafe and in Harvard Square.
